In addition, I think it is important for us to show that although we are amputees, we are "handi-capable", and actively participating in life. In this regard, I suggest that we use social media with pictures or short videos of us handling daily tasks, such as gardening, hobbies, home repairs, cooking, dancing, etc., and then outdoor sporting events such as kayaking, horseback riding, hand cycling, bocce ball, bowling, hiking or golf. We need to show that just because we are amputees, we haven't stop enjoying life.

As you know, we have recently been invited to participate in hand cycling with Ramp It Up, and rock climbing with Southern California Prosthetics. For the more adventurous of you, Rosemary Kidd spoke with me about scuba certification for amputees. I would love to see *FAST* make an appearance at events like this to try

show support for the amputee community and have some fun while we are at it.

I would like to continue the monthly meetings with speakers because I think professional education is important, but I also think that sharing personal experiences can be a source of inspiration for all of us.







A short autobiography by Joe Buracchio

Retired as Director of Imaging Services from the medical field after 40 years. I retired from the medical field in February 2015. On March 15, I was hit with sepsis, which turned into septic shock, which put me in the hospital for the next 6 months. I was very fortunate as the physicians who cared for me gave me less than a 10% chance of survival. To keep me alive, I had to go through several blood transfusions (31bags), a

colectomy, which left me with a permanent colostomy, amputations of both my legs below the knee, my left hand and the fingers of my right hand. That is where I started on this journey.



Today, with the support of my loving wife, family and health care team, I am getting around on two prosthetic legs, a myoelectric left hand, an electric wheelchair, and a cane. Needless to say this really turned my world upside down. This is not how I planned my retirement. I learned from this that a person can be far stronger and determined than they ever thought possible. Everything can be accomplished if you keep moving forward with a positive attitude.

Bill Nessel, the leader of the Redlands Amputee Support group passed away on January 1 of this year. Many of you have run into him at various Amputee Coalition events and definitely at the Annual Conference with his hat on backwards, his leg propped up on his motorized chair and his ubiquitous camera lens clicking away recording the goings on as only he could do. He was an invaluable mentor, a great CPV, a dedicated leader and a consummate positive influence in the lives of many of us in the limb loss community. **He will be sorely missed.**
